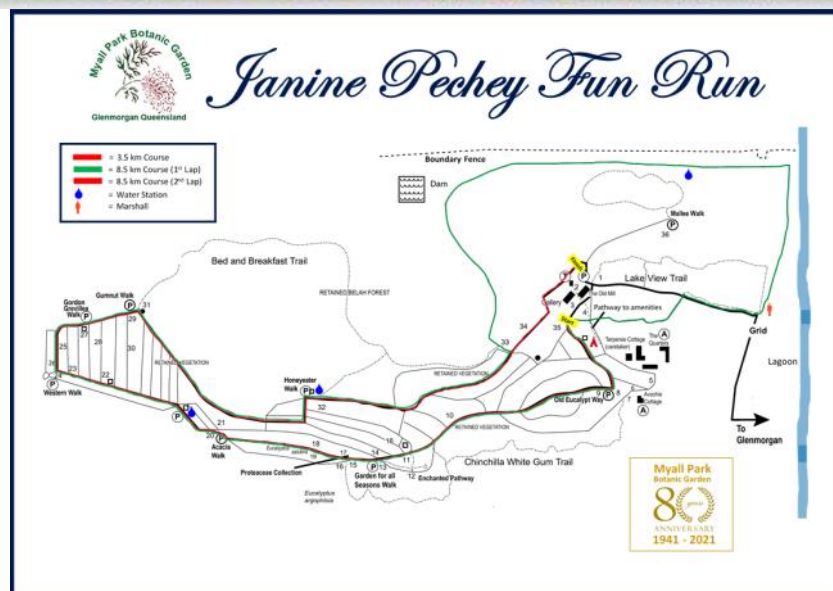

Obituary – Lorraine Barnes

All who knew Lorraine Barnes were saddened to hear of her death in February, not long after her 87th birthday. Lorraine was born in Yorkshire, England, worked as a radiographer in London, and married her English sweetheart Roy in Kenya where they lived and worked until increasing threats of terrorism decided them to move to Australia in 1961.

After some time looking around, they eventually settled at Cooma, Surat where they brought up their three children and became an important part of our community. They were people who got things done, Roy on the property, Lorraine in the community.

Her daughter Anne said in her eulogy 'For an English lady to go to the wilds of Kenya, and then the remoteness of rural Qld, it must have been challenging and lonely, especially with babies and small children to wrangle, but I never heard her complain about any of it... (She) coped and made the best she could. And she never gave up – if she made up her mind to do something, she did it.'

And Lorraine did it very well. She exercised her people skills by helping out with all kinds of community ventures such as undertaking an oral history project with the older people of the district for the local Cobb & Co Museum in Surat.

She was a talented musician and loved to share her passion through teaching both young and old. She was a great accompanist, and formed several choirs in her time in both Surat and

Glenmorgan, and later in Pittsworth after moving there to retire. I have fond memories of singing on several occasions with Glenmorgan's Cobblegun Choir conducted by Lorraine in the gallery at the Garden.

It wasn't hard to persuade Lorraine to take on the voluntary position of Art and Gallery Manager at the Garden in 1999, and it was very apt that the main event to celebrate Dave Gordon's centenary that year should be a Festival of Music. Visitors to the Garden will be familiar with the Thonga-phone, but few were there to witness its creation – the two musicians engaged as facilitators had Lorraine Barnes, Carol McCormack, Pat Mitchell and Dorinda Schwennesen cutting PVC pipe and moulding it into shape over heat. A metal collar was attached at one end of the PVC and they then lashed the curved lengths together. Gradually this weird 'instrument' grew, suspended from the rafters of the Old Sawmill and at last we could see what it was! It has provided much pleasure and amusement now for over 20 years.

As Manager, Lorraine was responsible for the events and exhibitions held there, and memorable ones from her time were botanical art workshops with Gillian Scott and Sally L'Estrange centred around the creation of the Cyberflora mural, Victoria Cooper's pinhole photography exhibition (pictured), and the very popular showing of Dorothy Gordon's landscapes in 2002.

Around this time, Lorraine was persuaded to become a member of our local Glenmorgan Art Group by a friend. She attended various art days and workshops and really enjoyed one of the botanical art workshops which appealed to her scientific nature, but she didn't stop there. She



continued to paint after moving to Pittsworth, and when the art group recently celebrated their 50th anniversary with an exhibition they were very proud to have Lorraine's work showing – and in her last days she expressed her pleasure at being asked to contribute.

Lorraine is survived by her husband of 62 years Roy, her 3 children Michael, Anne and Peter, grandchildren Clare, Jodie, Fred, Josie, and great grand daughter Zoe. She was someone who always gave 110%, and she was very loved.

The April/May Working Bee

Twelve people in all came and volunteered much time and energy during the recent working bee. Dick, Peter and Joan brought many plants that they have grown from seed, Ross brought some rare acacia trees and a few other plants came from Sue and Jane. It is no small task to plant a single shrub, firstly dig a deep hole in very hard ground, add water and leave for 12 hours, dig a little deeper then add four or five different additives to improve the soil plus a little fertilizer. When this is mixed well with the existing soil the shrub can be planted, then mulched, then caged, then labelled, then irrigation drippers placed appropriately. Taking all of this into consideration we are always amazed when 250 plants can be successfully planted, with only a few blisters from the crow bars! During the working bee we also managed to collect some feed lot manure from a wonderful neighbour (Amy) and this is now one of the additives when planting. We also set up a compost pile so that weed species can become useful additions to the soil.

Julie and Rod, the new caretakers have settled into Terpersie and are doing all they can to stem the tide of mice and learn how everything works or doesn't work! They are doing a wonderful job and we are very appreciative of their contributions. Rod has managed to get Tilly, the old Toyota ute going again, he is obviously a master mechanic. Thank you Rod.

The new secretary, Jane, is very keen to see the Camp Ground spruced up and looking a little more loved. Towards this goal we have constructed a few bush



screens and have planted more shrubs and grasses. The soil there is very poor and so the planting area needs to be built up and improved and then planted with dense, low shrubs. It is all very time consuming but we hope will lead to more campers staying for longer.

“Save Our Waterways Now” visits Myall Park Botanic Garden

SOWN nursery manager, Dick Harding, has been volunteering at Myall Park Botanic Garden for about eight years and has been propagating and planting arid region plants. Dick organised for eight volunteers from SOWN to visit in June. ‘Planting a single plant at a botanic garden in semi-arid land is quite time-consuming’ Dick told us. This proved to be an understatement. In three days of solid work, we planted 57 plants. ‘This would have taken two hours before morning tea on Enoggera Creek’, SOWN President John Abbott said.

Despite the hard work and some bad behaviour by mice, everyone from SOWN enjoyed the crisp mornings, roaring fires, starry nights, 75 bird species seen, and great company.



AND YET MORE WORKERS

The next working bee group to arrive at Myall Park will be the Eremophila Study Group from Brisbane. They are all very knowledgeable and will be able to recommend species, pruning techniques, planting and irrigation needs of the many eremophila plants that we have in the Garden. Perhaps they will bring a few new species to add to our collection.

We hope they will also find time to wander through the Garden and enjoy the setting. Many thanks to the leader, Jan Glazebrook, for suggesting this excursion. We look forward to learning from them.



Did you know that the flowers of the eremophilas are shaped appropriately for the dominant pollinator, either bird or insect. Check a flower next time you have a chance and guess the pollinator.

Rare and threatened species at Myall Park Botanic Garden

From the early 1940's, Dave Gordon began planting Australian native species at Myall Park beginning with the eucalypts in what is now the Old Eucalypt Way.

In the mid 1950's he sent Len Miller and his wife to Western Australia to collect as many unique species as they could find, to send back to Dave for future propagation. This evolved over the years resulting in the 90 hectares of Botanic Garden there is today.

Dave's vision led to the establishment and registration of Myall Park Botanic Garden, which is now on the State Heritage register. To continue his Dream, we as the honorary Board and Friends of the Garden have sourced many hundreds of Australian species and strive to give prominence to those which are endangered or under threat in their natural environments.

All those connected with the Garden know this story. Our many visitors may not. Some plant divisions concentrate on specifics such as Proteaceae, Acacias, and Eucalypts in the Gumnut Walk. However in the wild, plants grow in communities, so varied plant species in our Honeyeater Walk - near the Bird Hide, Garden for All Seasons - where something is always flowering, and Western Walk - for arid land species, have a wider variety.

Extensive replanting has been necessitated by the crippling drought of 2019. Even the district's native Belahs, Cypress and Acacias have died in their thousands. We seized the opportunity to enlarge our water storage and the following rains have resulted in a rewarding recovery. We have taken the opportunity to extend our species range.

Planted species are indicated around the Garden divisions with green or red labelled stakes. Red denotes a rare or threatened species. When funds permit, more species will be given a permanent label indicating botanical names and the states in Australia where they occur.

There is a substantial cost in providing these plants and the hundreds of labels needed to present them to our visitors. Volunteers manufacture these but it is a time-consuming task.

We are calling for donations, both large and small, towards this cost. Of course if possible, we would like you all to come and see for yourselves.

Report of the birds of Myall Park Botanic Gardens, June 2021

I visited Myall Park Botanic Gardens as part of a group from SOWN led by Dick Harding. Most of my daylight hours were spent surveying the birds within the Gardens and on the adjacent lagoon. In the three-day period I identified 75 species and no doubt a more skilled observer could have found a few more.

In the last 6 years, 183 bird species at Myall Park have been reported to eBird, an international data base of bird sightings. This means that almost 25% of Australian birds have been seen in the Gardens. Some of these birds would be resident and breed in the Garden and others would represent birds on migration from one part of the continent to another.

Without any doubt, Myall Park is an extremely important sanctuary for a large proportion of Australian birds, which are declining at an alarming rate. Clearly the Garden is an avian biodiversity hotspot and although small in area, it “punches above its weight” in terms of importance to the Brigalow local and migrating birds.

I made 4 visits at different times of day and at all times except for mid-afternoon there were always birds drinking and or bathing.

Overall, I think for the birds of the Brigalow, Myall Park is very important for the maintenance of local avian biodiversity and for ornithologists it is a great place to study the birds of the Brigalow. I really enjoyed my short visit.

Grow your own Dinosaur!

Cadellia pentastylis

Ooline or Scrub Myrtle

This beautiful small tree has become vulnerable in the wild. It belongs to the Surianaceae family and is the sole species in that family. It dates from the Pleistocene period when much of Australia was rainforest and the climate far wetter than it is today. There are very few remaining plant species which can claim this ancient history. (Actually the dinosaurs died out millions of years before the Pleistocene Age but it made a good heading!)

A beautiful specimen of Ooline grows in the Brisbane City Botanic Gardens having been planted in 1864 – this 25m tall specimen is an outstanding example as the species which is rarely over 10m. Ooline trees are erect and somewhat irregular with decorative small bright green leaves and distinctive red new foliage. Five petal flowers are attractive white to pink, and the trunk has rough tile-pattern bark.

The Ooline tree requires good drainage and reasonably deep and fertile soil - many areas of Brisbane and its outer reaches suit this requirement. It prefers the company of 'friends' and may not do well as a stand-alone feature plant – so plant a grove.

The natural habitat of Ooline is actually on the ranges, extending from northern New South Wales through the southern to the western Darling Downs and as far north as Central Queensland. Much of its habitat has been cleared by the continual burning by aborigines to create grasslands and more recently for grazing and farming practices, however impressive stands still exist today.

At Myall Park Botanic Garden eight of these trees were planted last year and a larger grove added at the western end of the Garden in April this year.
